2 Let's cook Japanese dishes!!

Today's recipe is "Gohan".

As some of you know, you can cook Gohan even if you don't have a rice cooker. Here is how to do it.

<u>Ingredients</u>

- Rice & Water(0.9ml of rice)
- Thick pot (an earthenware pot is recommended)



- 1 Wash the rice and soak in water for about 20 min.
- ② Drain ① through a colander.
- ③ Put the rice and water in the pot and cover it with the lid. Cook it on high heat until boiling. (When boiling, bubbles are coming up around the rim of the pot.)
- (4) Lower the heat to extremely low (←important!!). Cook for exactly 10 min.
- ⑤ After 10 min., turn up the heat again and cook for exactly 1 min. (Ignore the pot's sound.)
- ⑥ Rest for about 10 min. Now ready!! Savor the simple but rich taste of "Takitate" (fresh) Gohan!!

③ Useful Japanese expression

Today's expression is "Daijyoubu desu" Daijyoubu means "It's OK."

Scene 1.

"Shindosou desu ne (You look very tired). Daijyoubu desu ka? (Are you all right)?" "Daijyoubu desu (I'm all right)."







Scene 2.

"Rejibukuro irimasu ka (Do you need plastic bags)?" "Daijyoubu desu (I don't need them)."

4 Japanese onomatopoeia

Today's onomatopoeia is "Pekopeko"(ペニペニ(Hiragana), ペコペコ(Katakana)). Pekopeko means that you are really hungry.
