We have **HOQUE MOHAMMAD MAHBUBUL** san from Bangladesh with us today. He is now in his 2^{nd} year on the Master's course and he belongs to the Department of Immunology.

- Hi Hoque san, thank you for coming today.
 - 1. First off, let me ask your first impression of Japan.
- "I felt like it's the second home to me. My home town is in a rural area and here Izumo has a similar rustic atmosphere. I love it."
- Wow, thank you, I'm happy to hear that.

2. I've heard that people in Bangladesh have curry every day. Is it right? Then, what kind of curry do you like the best?

- "That's right, we have curry every day. I love fish curry in particular, and I try to put as much vegetable as possible because of its nutrition and colorful appearance. Eggplant, broccoli, tomato, potato ..., Potato is a must. Spice is also important. Turmeric, chili, cumin, coriander..."

- Yeah, I know you hold welcome parties, farewell parties, and other parties occasionally in the dormitory and it always comes with the smell of curry. Maybe you can get by in an unfamiliar country like here thanks to such strong bonds. Good thing.

6. If you have a chance, where would you like to visit in Japan?

- "Shimane University takes students to Onan town every year. I hear it's fun. I missed the chance last year and I cannot go this year either but I'd love to visit it someday while I'm in Japan."
- Onan is rich in nature and people there are kind. Maybe you can experience farming or other local businesses firsthand and enjoy some events such as cooking class or school visits if you join the program. I bet it will be an unforgettable memory for you."

② Let's try Student's recipe!!

Today's recipe is "Oyako-don (Chicken and Egg Rice Bowl)"



Ingredients (Serves 2)

- Two bowls of rice
- 1 Chicken thigh, diced or sliced
- 4 Eggs, roughly beaten
- 1/2 Onion, thinly sliced
- ★ 2 Tablespoons of Soy sauce
- ★ 2 Tablespoons of Mirin
- ★ 1 Tablespoon of Japanese Sake
- ★ 1 Tablespoon of Sugar
- ★ 1 Teaspoon of Bonito-based dashi powder
- 160 ml of water
- Small bunch of spring onion, chopped

Incidentally, in Japanese, "oyako" means "parent and their child(ren)" and "-don" means a bowl of rice topped with something.



These 5 ingredients with ★ can be replaced by 40 ml of "men-tsuyu", a Japanese soup stock readily available in supermarkets.

- 1. Cook sliced onions with all seasonings (soy sauce, sugar, mirin, Japanese sake, dashi powder, and water) using a small frying pan for two minutes on medium heat.
- 2. Add the diced or sliced chicken and cook for another 3 minutes or until the chicken is cooked.
- 3. Drizzle the 2/3 of beaten egg over the chicken and onion and stir once.
- 4. Cover the pan and cook for 30 sec.
- 5. Add the rest of the egg and cook until the egg is done to your preference. (Do not cover the pan)
- 6. Pour the chicken and egg on top of steamed rice and sprinkle with the chopped spring onions.
- 7. Now, it's ready. Enjoy the Oyako-don while it's still hot!!


